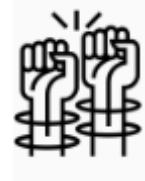

Co-production of community services to create common goods



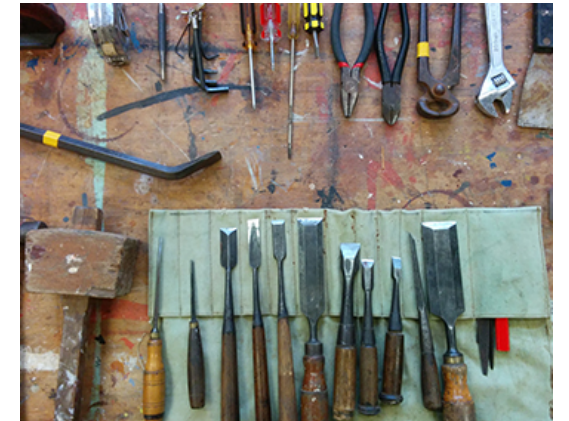

EMPOWERING: NEW INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

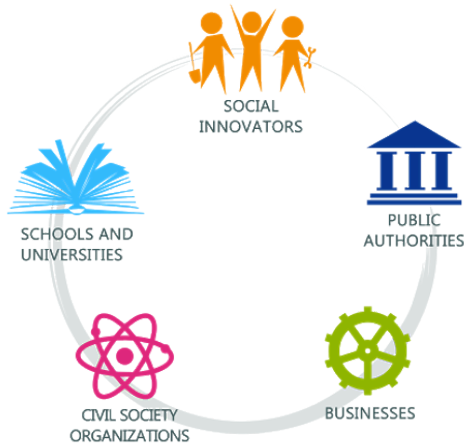
Collaborative urban governance in the city as a commons
